EXPLANATION OF EXEMPTIONS

SUBSECTIONS OF TITLE 5, UNITED STATES CODE, SECTION 552





oss recently furnished a memorandum advising that their records show that Bogdan Radica is possibly an agent working in behalf of the German Government. He was born in Spalato; Yugoslavia, August 26, 1904, and was, at one time, Secretary at the Yugoslavian Legation in Athens. Oss stated they recently received a report concerning a person whose name is identical with the subject and who may be residing in New York City. Oss desired to know whether these persons were identical.

The Bureau files reflect that the MIS made available a list of known and suspected espionage agents of foreign countries which was furnished to the Army by Italian sources in Italy. The list reportedly was maintained by the counterespionage section of the Italian SIM. One Bogdan Radica, born August 26, 1904, at Spalato, Yugoslavia, was listed as a suspected agent rendering services for Yugoslavia. He was listed as secretary to the Yugoslavian Legation in Athens. His parents are Lorenzo and Povica Culic. There is no report that he was working for the Germans.

Through a confidential source Radica was reported to have advised the Executive Board of the Slovenian-American National Council that the Yugoslav Government in Exile had discharged him because he had refused to support

and the Chetnicks. Radica offered his services as a propagandist to the Slovenian-American National Council. Radica reportedly wrote numerous articles for the Yugoslavenski Glasnik, a weekly Croatian newspaper in Chicago. These articles reportedly favored the United Compantee of South Slavic Americans, S.A.N.C. and the Partisan Movement.

An OSS report dated September 23, 1943, encoded Yugomania on the American Scene" stated that Radica as director of the Information Center had been attached to the Yugoslavian Consul General, New York, for the ostensible purpose of carrying on a certain amount of information work out that he had not been provided with working funds.

Memorandum for Mr. Ladd

From a highly confidential source, it was learned on March 13, 1945, that the State Department had received cables from London requesting a visa for Radica who was to work for the Yugoslavian Information Center.

From the above, it is believed that Bogdan Radica, who was attached to the Information Service, is probably identical with Radica mentioned by OSS; however, there is no way of knowing whether this individual is identical with the person concerning whom OSS recently received a report.

RECOMMENDATION:

It is recommended that the Liaison Section contact OSS for the purpose of advising them that Bogdan Radica was with the Yugoslavian Information Center New York and is probably identical with Radica mentioned in the first paragraph of their memorandum. However, it should be pointed out that there is no information available which would indicate that Radica was in fact working for the German Intelligence. Further, OSS should be requested to supply detailed information as to the identity of the person concerning whom they recently received a report and particularly to furnish information as to Radica's alleged connection with the German Intelligence, as well as the source of their information.

There is being enclosed herewith a copy of the Readers Digest for October 1946 which contains an article entitled "Yugoslavia's Tragic Lesson to the World," written by BOCDAN RADITSA. Inasmuch as a review of this article reflected that RADITSA had considerable knowledge of the Yugoslavian Security Police, "Ozna" he was interviewed by Special Agents and ROBERT J. LAYPHERE on September 27, 1946.

Dir. BOODAN RADITSA advised that his name can also be spelled as BOODAN RADICA. He resides at 131 East 93rd Street, New York City and his telephone number is Atwater 9-1123. He is married and has two children.

RADITSA was born at

Split, Yugoslavia on August 26, 1904.

Toverment in 1928. He later become the Chief of the Press Section of the Yugoslavian Government in Athens, Greece and from 1935 to 1939 was connected with the Yugoslavian Delogation to the League of Nations in Geneva, Switzerland. After his return to Yugoslavia in 1939 he was scheduled to head the Press Section of the Hinistry of Information in Yugoslavia but protests from because of his pro-British and pro-American sympathies led to his being sent to the United States as the Chief of the Press Section at the Yugoslavian Legation in Tashington, D. C. He entered the United States in October of 1940 traveling on a diplomatic passport. In May of 1942 he was transferred to the Yugoslavian Information Center in New York City, where he remained until December of 1943.

in TITO's rise to power and saw in TITO the possibility of the forming of a democratic Yugoslavia. This undoubtedly was based to some degree on the fact that he is a Croat and was against the Sarbian domination of the Yugoslavian Government. He then became active with the United Committee of South Slavic Americans making speeches in Detroit and Chicago. He also wrote for the magazines "Nation" and "New Republic" and also for Croatian newspapers calling for the recognition of TITO as the government which should be supported by the United Nations.

RADITSA states, however, that he was not a Communist and in fact by the same anti-Communist because of his Catholic religion and other beliefs but was interested in the new movement as he saw in it the possibilities of a united Yugoslavia.

After his resignation in December of 1943 from his post with the Yugoslavian Information Center he was not a member of the Yugoslavian Government until November of 1944 at which time he received an invitation London Government to join it and shortly thereafter he left from for London. In London he was attached to the Press Section of Government in Exile. On Morch 30, 1945 he was invited by the Ministry of Information of TITO's Government to join that government in Yugoslavia and he arrived in Belgrade on April 15, 1945. He was placed in charge of the Foreign Press Section of the Ministry of Information. At first RADITSA was given some freedom in his new job, personally dealing with foreign correspondents and also supervising the analysis of the foreign press. However, inasmuch as he was not a Communist Porty member both of these functions were taken away from him and were supervised by his assistants who according to him were Communists and were members of Ozna and in time he became a mere figurehead. He was also refused permission to place in his press section persons whom he felt were capable and were known to him. Relative to his work and to his troubles in this position reference is made to the article which is being forwarded with this letter.

dovernment wanted him to return and were contemplating giving him a foreign position. However, after reaching Italy and giving the matter considerable thought he reached the decision not to return and applied at the American Consulate for a visa to enter the United States. This non-immigrant visa was dated May 14, 1946. Since his return to the United States he has not been employed but is at the present time contemplating doing a lecture tour of the United States speaking on conditions in Yugoslavia as he found them. However, prior to any such lecture tour he intends to confer with State Department officials as to whether or not they have any objections to this.

RADITSA also plans to get in touch with the Irmigration authorities in order to ascertain if his status as a non-immigrant can be changed so that he can remain permanently in the United States. However, if he is not able to do this he will return to Italy where his wife has an income.

RADITSA is also considering writing a book although he has not to date actually started the book. However, he has been in consultation with at least two publishers relative to it.

Conditions in Yugoslavia

.

RADITSA furnished considerable information as to the conditions in Yugoslavia at the present time and it is to be noted that he appeared to be completely disillusioned as to the present government. However, he believes that the only way in which Yugoslavia can rid itself of TITO's regime will be through a war between the United States and the Soviet Union. According to him today the working class in Yugoslavia realizes that they have suffered the most from the new type of government and are bitterly anti-Communist. Thile they were promised shorter working hours and better living conditions they found that they are working eight hours a day and then are required daily to do one hours voluntary work for the State followed by one hours work for the Committee of the Syndicate.

RADITSA explained that a city is divided into sections and each section is divided into streets which are governed by Committees which are termed "Committees of the Street". The Committee of the Street is controlled by the Communist Party members and governs the people living within its street. The Superintendant of each apartment house is responsible to the Committee and reports on the activities of everyone in his house.

The Committee in its governing activities is able to supervise closely the lives of the people and to insure "block control" for the government. The Committee holds meetings approximately every third night

at which time instructions are read from the government and propaganda talks are given. This is followed by an open forum at which time members, usually party members, are allowed to call to the attention of the Committee breaches of the rules and regulations by various persons living on the street. These can be for very trivial things such as failure to perform willingly the amount of work required by the Committee or for grumbling against the government. These criticisms can have very serious repercussions and occasionally will result in the person being moved to another section of the country or just disappearing.

The Committee of the Street is also responsible for the repair of its section, and the maintenance of public buildings and streets. It can also be called upon to furnish a certain number of men for the repair of other facilities.

On the street the Committee of the Syndicate governs the persons in whatever occupation they are employed. This Committee which is comparable to an industrial trade union in the United States has far reaching powers over the worker. The worker is responsible to this Committee for the amount of work that he performs, for his attendance at work. The Committee of the Syndicate on the other hand purports to represent the worker in bettering his conditions and welfare. This Committee also meets every third night at which meetings the workers are required to attend and at which time speeches are made and instructions given relative to the particular occupation covered by that Committee. This again is followed by a discussion period at which time criticisms can be leveled at the individual workers for failure to work hard enough or for criticism of the covernment and the like. This Committee also requires its members to give one hour daily "voluntarily" in work which is designated by this Committee.

Thus it will be seen that the Committee of the Street governs the life of the people at home and at the same time he is governed and controlled at his work by the Committee of the Syndicate. In both Committees the Communist Party members are in complete control and as will be seen later in this letter Ozna closely controls the Committees.

RADITSA also stated that in his opinion conditions in Yugoslavia at the time he left the country were in better shape than they had been in the previous year and he stated that reconstruction is proceeding at a fair pace. He stated that starvation has been averted to a considerable

degree by UNRRA shipments and advised that this had made a tremendous imprecuion upon the people who are aware that this food comes from the United States. RADITSA stated that this has more than offset the Russian propaganda and working strongly in favor of the United States.

According to him, many men of _______ Army, the Ustashi and even Pertisans have taken to the hills and are carrying out guerrilla warfare awaiting only an opportunity to break out in full rebellion. He feels that in the event of a war between the United States and the Soviet Union there will quickly rise in Yugoslavia an armed rebillion such as took place after the Germans conquered the country.

Ozna in Yugoslavia

The Communist Section of Ozna handles matters dealing with Communist Party discipline and other nattors within the Party itself. The Foreign Section handles foreign intelligence and matters relating to foreign relations. This section, according to RADITSA is presently located in Zagreb. Relative to this section, RADITSA stated that he understands that Ozna men are very active in Italy and Austria at the present time. He stated that he has heard there has been a number of kidnappings of persons of Yugoslavian descent who are hostile to the Yugoslavian Government and who are residing in those countries. The Political Section of Owna handles matters relating to internal police work and controls the Ozna members in the Committee of the Syndicate and the Committee of the Street. Relative to both of these committees. according to RADITSA, they are actually controlled by Ozna and their work is closely supervised. RADITSA estimates Ozna as having 100,000 members at the present time. He stated that the superintendents of every apartment house report to Ozna and from such a close control everything that takes place in Yugoslavia today is supervised in some manner by Ozna.

Yugo's Terror Reign Told by Ex-Official

By FREDERICK WOLTMAN Scripps-Howard Staff Writer

NEW YORK, Sept. 25—Yugoslavia is "a dictatorship of terror and death" by a small clique of Communists directed from Moscow, according to Bogdan Raditsa, who last fear was named chief of the foreign press section in Marshal Tito's Ministry of Information.

Not even Tito controls the terfor, for Russia treats Yugoslavia as A subjugated country, the former high ranking Yugoslav official charges in a forthcoming book which lifts the iron curtain from his native land.

Since the "liberation," the Communists themselves admit they have got rid of 500,000 Yugoslavs; their purpose is to liquidate the entire agricultural, commercial and industrial Yugoslav non-Communist middle class, says Mr. Raditsa.

The October Reader's Digest out today carries a condensation of the Raditsa autobiography under the title "Yugoslavia's Tragic Lesson to the World."

100,000 SPIES

The author reveals that Yugoslavia's secret political police force, OZNA, was organized by Pussian espionage specialists and employs 100.000 spies in a country of 14 million people. Its head, Lt. Gen. Aleksander Rankovich, "is empowered . arrest without warrant, and to execute without trial, any citizen deemed to be 'an enemy of the people."

Meanwhile, the Communists "have given Yugoslavia an army of 500,000 men and have indoctrinated that army with ceaseless propaganda for new and bloodier international conflicts."

Mr. Raditsa was stationed in New York in 1943 as head of the Yugoslav government's press service. No Communist, he neveretheless supported the Tito partisans and, after the "liberation," returned to Belgrade confident that Tito offered a future democratiq Yugoslavia.

Altho head of the foreign press service in Belgrade, he war never permitted to see foreign journalists. This was left to his two assistants, both Communists. Disillusioned, Mr. Raditsa got a passport thru a Communist friend and has returned to New York.

RECORD INFORMATION CONCERNING

Bogdan Raditsa, who is also known as Bogdan Radica, is a writer now in the United States who has been notified that his temporary visitor's visa will expire on November 1, 1947, at which time the Immigration and Naturalization Service has informed him that he will not be allowed to remain in the United States.

Raditsa is a citisen of Yugoslavia and is of the Croatian Race. He was for many years attached to the press service of the Ministry of Information of the Royal Yugoslavian Government being stationed for a number of years at the Yugoslavian Embassy in Washington, as head of the press section. Upon the advent of Tito to power in Yugoslavia, Raditsa became an ardent supporter of Tito and resigned his position with the Yugoslavian Government. He was, thereafter, in contact with the pro-Communist organization, the United Committee of South Slavic Americans, and made a number of public statements in favor of Tito. Thereafter, he was invited to join the Tito Covernment in Yugoslavia and left the United States going to Yugoslavia where he became the head of the press section of the Ministry of Information in Belgrade, Yugoslavia. Raditsa was invited to become a member of the Yugoslavian Communist Party but declined mainly because of his Catholic faith. from power, Raditsa's position became exceedingly After the ousting of difficult and he was in his work surrounded by Communists who closely checked all of his activities. He quickly became disillusioned and in the spring of 1946, succeeded in leaving Yugoslavia and coming to the United States, After he arrived in the United States, he was warned by Yugoslavian offficials not to engage in any acitivity which would be deemed detrimental to the Yugoslavian Government; however, in August, 1946, he published an article which appeared in the "Reader's Digest" and exposed the Tito Regime and conditions in Yugoslavia.



On October 29, 1947, I forwarded to you a memorandum which set forth certain facts concerning Bogdan Baditsa, who is subject to deportation at the present time in view of the fact that he is unable to legalize his entry into the United States. You returned this memorandum to me asking for my recommendation.

I believe that if the Administration is going to follow the practice of granting asylun to political refugees, Bogdan Baditsa is entitled to consideration in that capacity. It is a fact that he has taken a strong stand against Communism and his deportation to Yugoslavia will undoubtedly result in his execution as a traitor. Press dispatches from time to time indicate that our government is affording asylun to opposition leaders from Balkan countries and if this is a fact, then I feel that Raditsa should certainly receive consideration as a political refugee. There is a broader aspect in a situation of this kind than the mere granting of asylum to a single anti-Communist leader. The deportation by the United States of a man whose anti-Communist sympathies are well known will have a most detrimental effect on the possible defection of officials of other Communist satellite nations.

It would be appreciated if, for interrogation purposes, information could be furnished regarding Bogdan Josip Radica, an alien.

Mr. Radica was born in Split, Dalmatia, Jugoslavia on August 26, 1904. He attended the Universities of Ljubliana, Florence, and Rome in the period from 1923 to 1927.

From 1929 to 1935, he was Press Attache in the Yugoslav Legation in Athens, Greece. From 1935 to 1940, he held the same position in the Yugoslav Delegation to the League of Nations in Geneva.

From October, 1940 to March, 1942, he was Chief of the Press Service in the Yugoslav Legation in Washington, D.C. In the latter month he became Chief of Press Service in the Royal Yugoslav Information Center at 812 Fifth Avenue, New York, N.Y. He left that position in October, 1943 when the Center closed.

In 1945, Radica is reported to have returned to Yugoslavia as Chief of the Foreign Press Department under the Ministry of Information. In 1946, he came to the United States as a political refugee on a permanent visa.

From 1940 to 1942 he resided at 2633 16th Street, N.W., Washington, D.C. and from 1942 to 1944 he resided at 108 East 86th STreet, New York, N.Y. He is said to be living at 131 East 93rd Street, New York, N.Y., at this time.

He is said to have written articles for the New Republic and the New An article on Jugoslavia written by Radica appears in the January 29, 1944 Leader. issue of The Nation. He has written articles with a decided anti-Communist tone for recent issues of Plain Talk. CEPPERAD RECORDING.


This Agency is in possession of reports of a limited investigation, conducted for the Office of Strategic Services in early 1944. Some informants believed Radica to be ambitious, hungry for power, intellectually dishonest, and indiscreet. We have, however, no later information.





Bogdan Raditsa, Yugoslavian information officer in Washington from 1940 to 1942, told the Immigration subcommittee of the Senate Judiciary Committee this work was being done by Dr. Joze Vilfan. Raditsa added that Vilfan, along with most of Marshal Tito's representatives in the United States, deserted Tito upon his break with Moscow and now serves as a Soviet agent rather than representing Yugoslavian interests.

Raditsa later described Vilfan as "the top man for espionage in this country." He is, said Raditsa, at the head of "all Yugoslavs en-

gaged in that work." At Lake Success, N. Y., Dr. Vil-

ciated Press reported.

"I know this Raditsa," he told newsmen. "I am surprised that a committee of the United States seems to give importance to a person who is so unimportant as Mr. Raditsa."

The witness described Sava N Kosanovic, now Yugoslav Ambassador to the United States, as a Communist "puppet." Under questioning, Raditsa said Kosanovic was "closely allied" with Communists in this country before the war. After becoming Ambassador, he said, Kosanovic "continued to visit Communist and front organizations."

The subcommittee is considering a bill to enable United States diplomatic representatives abroad to prevent known or suspected subversive agents from entering this country as foreign diplomats.

Much mystery surrounded a witness who is to be heard in executive session in the very near future. Members of the subcommittee staff refused to identify this witness, explaining he was so "hot" mention of his name would endanger his life. They did, however, drop a hint that he was attached to United Nations headquarters and indicated that his testimony would be of great importance in unveiling names and methods of subversive agents.

The witness said he was in Belgrade when the first Russian officers and politicians entered in 1945 and was "tremendously impressed" by their statements that war with the United States was inevitable and the United States must be "crushed and destroyed."

"I was all the more impressed," he explained, "because I had just come from America, where everyone thought very highly of Russia and nobody dreamed of a war with the Soviet Union."

Often Checked in Speech

A burly man with a large balding head and an anxious manner, Raditsa spoke with a rich accent and so rapidly that McCarran occasionally asked him to slow down for the benefit of reporters. When asked questions, he often launched into sideline explanations that kept the stenotyper at his elbow in a frenzy of impromptu interpretation.

The "main mission" of Yugoslav diplomats in foreign countries, Raditsa declared, "is not to develop diplomatic relations but to work for the Soviet Union and its plans in the United States or wherever they are, and the world revolution must be prepared and propagated."

"Communist diplomacy," he declared, "is nothing but a legalized and subversive network spread all over the free world . . . To be a spy in a Soviet state . . . is not derogatory, but the greatest sign of confidence and trust which can



The source stated that it was his observation that a common failing of US representatives abroad is that these US representatives somehow manage successfully never to take part in any activity which receives favorable attention and at the same time stimulates and exchange of basic understandings between the bulk of the people of a foreign country such as Spain and our country, the US.

The source stated that he would consider it of extreme importance to the welfare of the US, to have the people of the US represented by individuals who would establish themselves in the eyes of the majority of the Spanish people on all levels rather than in the eyes of the governing minority. The source added that if this were done then certain of the US representatives in a country such as Spain could be utilized to make it known to the bulk of the people of that country that even though the US Government pursues a policy of support to an individual such as FRANCO, this is done for purposes of expediency and that the US policy would, in the future, be amenable to alteration to suit the interests of the bulk of the Spanish people.

Bogdan Raditsa also known as Bogdan Radica

On October 22, 1963, a confidential source, who has furnished reliable information in the past, advised that Bogdan Radica participated in an anti-Tito demonstration at 47th Street and First Avenue, New York, New York, on October 22, 1963.

On August 2, 1967, the same source advised that Bogdan Raditsa, who resides at 15 West 67th Street, New York, New York, is a professor at Fairleigh Dickinson University, Rutherford, NJ. The source stated that Raditsa goes to Italy for several months each summer and that Raditsa had departed the United States for Florence, Italy in June, 1967, and was to return to the United States in September, 1967. The source also advised that meetings with Croatian-Americans from all over the United States are occasionally held at Raditsa's residence. One such meeting was held during May, 1967, with Croatian-American "Intellectuals", at which time they reportedly discussed the problem of maintaining the teaching of the Croatian language in Yugoslavia.

The source further stated that Raditsa is also a writer, who has contributed articles to many English and foreign language publications.

The INS file further reflected that Raditsa studied in Florence and Rome, Italy, and graduated from the University of Rome. He was in the Yugoslav diplomatic service, serving first in Athens, Greece from 1929 to 1935, then at the League of Nations, Geneva, Switzerland, from 1935 to 1940. From 1940



to 1942, he served in the Yugoslav Legation in Washington, D.C., and from 1942 to the end of 1944, he was chief of the Yugoslav information center, New York, New York, when he went to London, England to become a part of the Yugoslav Government in exile. In April, 1945, he went to Belgrade, Yugoslavia and was a member of the Tito Government until October, 1945, at which time he resigned from that Government. From the time of his resignation until the middle of 1946, he resided in Rome, Italy, where he wrote magazine articles exposing Tito's Communism. Raditsa testified before the Subcommittee on Immigration and Naturalization of the committee on the judiciary of the United States Senate on May 11, 1949. Reference is made to your communication dated October 21, 1975, your references 5/13/1 and 425/75, captioned "Bogdan Radica."

Enclosed herewith is a copy of an FBI communication dated October 8, 1967, relating to the subject. Please note that subject's last name, according to United States Immigration and Naturalization Service records, is Bogdan Raditsa, with an alias, Bogdan Radica.

In addition to the information contained in the enclosed communication, the files of this Bureau indicate that the subject is affiliated with the Croatian People's Council, also known as the Croatian National Council, a Yugoslav enigre organization formed curing 1974 for the purpose of espousing the cause for an independent State of Croatia. This Council endeavors to consolidate into one organization the many smaller Croat organizations whose aims are also to achieve independence for Croatla.

The subject is, according to information contained in our files, a university professor, writer and publicist. He has prepared articles for various American newspapers and magazines and is the author of several books including the Agony of Europe, The Mediterranean Return, and Croatia 1945. He has also written for various Croatian emigre publications, including the Crostian Voice, Crostian Review and The Morning Star (Danica). He has also participated at various conferences sponsored by historical societies and lectures at seminars and discussion-type forums relating to Croatia, present and future.



Independent Croatia (NACIC), which is an umbrella-type organization, the membership of which consists of members of other emigre organizations. The NACIC has no formal headquarters and no membership list. The purpose of the organization is to help Croatia gain independence from Yugoslavia and become a separate state. The NACIC hopes to bring this about through appeals to the U.S. Department of State and the United Nations. He advised that he was and is a United States citizen and that born in his loyalties are torn between both countries. that the NACIC is not doing anything illegal nor is he, as a citizen of the U.S., doing anything illegal in furthering the goals of the NACIC for a separate Croatian state. 
